The Bible: Full of Contradictions, or Amazing Unity? (Pt. 1)

The Bible has been and will always be attacked by those who do not want to submit themselves to the will of God. One of the ways in which the Bible is attacked is to claim that it contains numerous contradictions. When one who has submitted him/herself comes to study God’s word, he or she sees amazing unity instead of contradictions. One of the great proofs of inspiration is the fact that the Bible has a unified theme from beginning to end: the redemption of mankind through the sacrifice of the Son of God.

The alleged contradictions include matters of numbers, matters of science, matters of history and matters of doctrine. If one believes that the Bible is the inspired, infallible word of God that it claims to be (2 Ti. 3:15-16), then that person, when confronted with an alleged contradiction, will look for a way to explain the apparent contradiction in a satisfactory way. Wayne Jackson

wrote, "When one is confronted with an alleged contradiction, he must ask himself these questions: (1) Is the same thing or person under consideration? (2) Is the same time period in view? (3) Is the language that seems to be self-contradictory employed in the same sense" (Jackson, 2003). If one truly wants to clear up any type of apparent discrepancies then these questions will always be answered correctly.

For instance, someone might say, "Ben is old." Someone else might say, "Ben is young." Can both of these statements be true? The answer is maybe. A child looks at someone who is an adult as being old. An elderly person looks at someone who is in his mid-thirties as being young. Not only that, there might be two different people named Ben under consideration. One Ben may be ninety years old while the other Ben may be ten years old. Also, it may be that Ben is young at heart but old in age. These are pointed out to show that a matter can be cleared up if all possible means of harmony are used. If they are used and shown to be faulty, then one may truly say there is a contradiction. This same type illustration was used in Jackson's article to prove this very point. However, the fact remains that, as Haley wrote years ago, "every difficulty and discrepancy in the scriptures is, and will yet be seen to be, capable of a fair and reasonable solution (Haley, pg. x).

Friends, when the Bible is studied by an open and objective mind, the fact remains that the Bible shows unfailing unity from Testament to Testament. Consider the prophecies concerning the coming Messiah. One first reads of this in Genesis 3:15, where we read that He will be of the seed of woman. As progression is made through the first book of the Bible, a promise to Abraham is found that, through him, all the nations of the earth were to be blessed (Gen. 12:1-3). Later in the Old Testament it is found that to David a promise of One who would sit on his throne was made by God (2 Sam. 7:12ff). Further still, one reads that Bethlehem will be the place of birth for the Messiah (Mic. 5:2).

Other prophecies could be pointed out, but notice how all of these are fulfilled. Jesus was born of a woman (Gal. 4:4). He was a descendant of both Abraham and David (Mat. 1:2, 6). Jesus was born in the city of Bethlehem (Mat. 2:1). This points to the unity of the Bible.
