THE PLANNING AND BUILDING OF THE CHURCH (Matthew 16:13-20)

I. Christ's church was purposed by God.

- A. Since before time, God had purposed the church to be built (Ephesians 3:9-11).
 - 1. In other words, God always had the church in mind.
 - 2. There has never been a time when the church was not intended by God.
 - 3. Men are to see God's wisdom through the church.
- B. Sadly, a lot of people misunderstand this and misunderstand the kingdom.
 - The Jews did during the days of Jesus.
 - a. They tried to take Jesus and make Him king (John 6:14-15).
 - b. The apostles didn't get it either (Acts 1:6).
 - 2. People still do today as well.
 - a. Dispensational Premillenialism got much of its traction from the Bible Schofield published.
 - (1) His comments fueled the flames.
 - (2) He believed the church was a "plan B."
 - (3) He would write, "The kingdom being thus postponed, what is revealed as filling and occupying this age?

 The church!"
 - b. Others teach this as well.
 - 3. What we see is a great misunderstanding about what God purposed, or planned, about the church.
- C. What these people do is question the omniscience of God by saying God did not foresee the stubbornness of the Jews
- D. There is no doubt that the prophets did not understand everything about which they prophesied (1 Peter 1:10-12).
 - 1. They did know something different was coming.
 - 2. Even though they may not have understood everything, that is not important.
 - 3. What is important is that the writers of the New Testament revealed what those prophecies meant.
 - 4. For instance, the apostles let us know exactly what Joel was prophesying about (Joel 2:28f; Acts 2:16f).
- E. Jesus knew His kingdom was not physical (John 18:36).
 - 1. It was always intended to be spiritual in nature.
 - 2. We can't let ourselves be blinded by preconceived ideas.
- F. God always intended for there to be a church.
- G. As Garland Elkins wrote, "Far from being a parenthesis of any kind, the church is at the heart of the timeless, ageless purpose of God."

II. Christ's church was prepared for by John and Jesus.

- A. Malachi 3:1: 4:5-6: Matthew 11:7. 10.
- B. Isaiah 40:3; Mark 1:3-4.
- C. John preached a simple message (Matthew 3:2).

- 1. John let his hearers know that the kingdom was close to being established.
- 2. These people needed to be ready for it.
- D. When Jesus began His earthly ministry, it was with the same message (Matthew 4:17).
 - The kingdom was close to being built.
 - 2. Notice what He told His apostles (Mark 9:1).
- E. Jesus helped prepare people for the kingdom through His preaching.
 - 1. The Sermon on the Mount is full of preparatory remarks.
 - 2. Jesus was letting them know that the spiritual status quo would not be accepted in this new kingdom.
 - 3. You would have to be willing to sacrifice, do more and go farther than what the Jews were currently doing.
- F. This was stated in the beginning of the sermon (Matthew 5:20).
 - 1. We can't really imagine the impact of this statement.
 - 2. These were the super-religious people of the day that Jesus referenced.
 - 3. Everyone thought the Pharisees were the righteous of the righteous.
- G. The audience was told that the kingdom had to be put above all else (Matthew 6:33).
 - 1. The Jews weren't putting God above all else in that day.
 - 2. The Pharisees definitely weren't as can be seen by the comments of Jesus about them in Matthew 23.
 - 3. They were hypocrites who put themselves above all others.
- H. Jesus prepared people for the kingdom through His parables.
 - 1. He taught about the value of the kingdom (field, pearl).
 - a. The church is priceless and worth giving up everything in order to obtain it, or be a part of it.
 - b. We need to view it that way today.
 - 2. Jesus taught that the church would grow.
 - a. It would start small but grow great.
 - b. This is what Daniel said about the kingdom hundreds of years before (Daniel 2:35).
 - 3. He even taught that not all the citizens of the kingdom would be saved.
 - a. Sadly, not all would remain faithful to the King.
 - b. Some would rebel or simply fall away.
 - c. Jesus did not want there to be any surprises on the judgment day.
- I. Everything Jesus and John taught was to prepare people.
- J. Even with all of this teaching one thing was lacking and that was a cornerstone for the building.
 - 1. The cornerstone, in that time, was the first stone laid.
 - 2. It was the most costly and largest of the stone pieces.
 - 3. The Psalmist long ago mentioned this stone (118:22).

- 4. Isaiah did as well (28:16).
- K. Jesus was and is that cornerstone (Acts 4:10-11; 1 Peter 2:7).
- L. The Jews most certainly rejected Jesus as He had said they wold (Mark 8:31).
- M. The ones who held Jesus as a King at the beginning of the week (Matthew 21:1-9) cried for His death at the end of the week (Matthew 27:22).
- N. With His death, all the materials needed were present and even the purchase price had been paid (Acts 20:28).

III. Christ's church was presented by the apostles.

- A. Generally, when something is built, there is some type of presentation ceremony.
 - 1. New buildings have ribbon cutting ceremonies.
 - 2. New homes have the keys presented to the new owners.
- B. The same is true for the church of Christ.
 - 1. Everything was ready for the church to be presented for the first time.
 - 2. All preparation had been made and the church had been purchased.
- C. When Jesus told the apostles some would see the kingdom come, He said it would be with power.
 - 1. Just before His ascension He told the apostles they would receive power from on high and it would take place in Jerusalem (Acts 1:8; Luke 24:49).
 - 2. This is what had been shown the prophets as well.
- D. Isaiah and Micah both said...(2:2-3).
 - 1. All nations would flow into this kingdom, which took place on the Day of Pentecost recorded in Acts 2:5.
 - 2. It would take place in the last days, as Joel had said, and the apostles attested to this fact (Acts 2:16).
 - 3. The Spirit came with power on this great day (Acts 2:1-4).
- E. What then came was a presentation of the church by the preaching of the gospel.
 - 1. These men preached that this was a fulfillment of prophecy.
 - 2. These men preached the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus.
 - a. They taught these very people had crucified Jesus (vs. 22).
 - b. That it had been done by the foreknowledge of God, destroying Premillenialism.
 - c. Jesus was raised from the dead (vs. 23).

d.

The apostles laid out the case for His resurrection by using the Psalms.

- F. The use of the Psalms, which were beloved by the Jews, caused numerous ones to be pricked in their heart.
- G. Peter and the other apostles then used the keys to the kingdom given them by the Lord to open up the kingdom to those that were pricked.
 - 1. They were told to repent and be baptized.
 - 2. Salvation was now possible for those who had killed God's Son.

- H.
- By being baptized, the Lord they crucified, added them to His church (Acts 2:47). As you read through Acts, you see this church growing just as Daniel and Jesus I. foretold
